Set a goal of 223 Soul Boxes to display with this sign, representing the number of gunfire injuries *and* deaths (including suicides) every day in the U.S., according to GunViolenceArchive.org, from January – June, 2022.

ART REVEALING THE GUNFIRE EPIDEMIC

**These Soul Boxes are part
of a nationwide movement.**

More than 200,000 hand-made, origami Soul Boxes were made by people across the U.S. who care about this escalating health crisis. Each Box represents a person killed or injured by gunfire.

The Soul Box Project was created by Portland artist Leslie Lee in the wake of the 2017 Las Vegas shooting. She knew people needed to *experience* the numbers in a visceral way, to really grasp the scale of the gunfire epidemic. As community groups and individuals folded Soul Boxes and sent them in, the Project gained momentum as a nationwide movement to raise awareness.

Since reaching the goal to exhibit 200,000 Soul Boxes on D.C.'s National Mall in 2021, the Project continues to provide dramatic visual support for all initiatives working to reduce gun violence. Additionally, the process of folding Boxes offers a calming, restorative activity to people experiencing the effects of trauma.

Exhibits represent and honor people of every race, cultural background, gender identity, sexual orientation, religious or political affiliation—none of whom are immune from this national epidemic.

**Over 85,000 people
were killed or injured by gunfire
in the U.S. *last year*.**

Gun violence. Defense. Accidents. Suicide.
Statistics can tell us facts, but they do not reveal the pain.

How do we put meaning to those numbers?

The Soul Box Project is *showing* people the numbers. Each Soul Box holds space for one life lost or injured by gunfire. These origami boxes were handmade by people who care about this public health crisis.

When people see the numbers, they *feel* the magnitude of this gunfire epidemic. And they realize they can make a difference: By locking up their guns. Supporting a friend who's struggling. Writing to a legislator.

Every Soul Box holds space for a single life.

Anyone can fold a Soul Box. The very act of folding can provide solace to a person experiencing trauma, directly or indirectly, from gunfire incidents.

This is something you can do – right now.
